I have never experienced seeing this kind of joy and hope among my people in my life. I can already see that this community centre has become a place of joy and hope for so many children who have faced despair and challenging lives in our community for so long. Thank you all from the bottom of my heart for your generosity and support.

After our school opened, we have children and their parents coming to our learning centre every day, pleading with us to accept and enrol them. We have had to say no because we do not currently have the capacity for all of them. Initially, we raised funds for 50 students and prepared materials for an additional 10. However, the number of students seeking enrolment has reached around 85, including displaced children and their families relocated to the village specifically for this school. Consequently, we have had to turn away more than 20 children. It is heart-breaking to see children return home due to our insufficient resources to support them.



Waymaker Community Clinic: During the Christmas holiday in 2024, we conducted a community healthcare service at my parents' house, which caused some inconvenience. Now that the building is completed, we will use it as a clinic after we have enough classrooms for the children. We have reserved two rooms for the clinic and the rest for staff offices and training rooms for short course programmes. We have one trained healthcare professional, who will be working as full time to oversee the community healthcare service.



Tailoring Training Project

Our dedicated volunteer team (a women's group from Lailenpi town) bravely initiated a 3 months tailoring training program in the village to support the most vulnerable Mara women who have been forced to stop studying, leave their jobs, displaced by conflict, or who live in remote areas. Waymaker supports the setup of the training centre by providing the necessary basic equipment, facilities and play the role of overseeing project overall management and leadership.

Tailoring training projects were not available in this type of community before the coup. If anyone was interested in learning tailoring, they had to travel to town or a big city. The three-month training program is led by professional trainers from the Women's Group in Lailenpi, most of whom volunteer their time, demonstrating strong solidarity and a commitment to empowering their fellow women.

Therefore, this initial project has provided not only practical skills but also crucial emotional support to the women. The project helps women feel valued and capable, and gives them the tools and skills they need to generate a small income for their daily needs. The tailoring training program has become a beacon of hope for women in the midst of this crisis. Over 80 women have received training, many of whom are now utilizing these skills to support themselves and their families within their respective communities. Currently 28 women are learning and will be finished by end of this month May'2025.

Creation of CDK and Dignity Kit

Waymaker Trust started creation of Clean Delivery Kit and Dignity kits (*Dignity kit: mainly readable sanitary pads for women and girls*) in 2022.

For pregnant women who have been displaced by conflict or who live in remote areas, CDK can be the difference between life and death. They can help to prevent infections and complications, and they can give women the confidence to give birth safely. CDK is especially important for women in crisis situations. Our community is facing humanitarian crisis, and many pregnant women in rural communities are struggling to access essential healthcare. CDK provides these women with the resources they need to give birth safely and to care for their babies.

In addition to providing physical supplies, CDK also provides emotional support to women and physical benefits, has also had a positive impact on the mental health of women. The kit helps to reduce the stigma associated with childbirth. We have produced and distributed over 2000 CDKs to women and babies and over 1000 reusable sanitary pads for girls and women in rural community.
